The Dean provides leadership to the College by establishing a compelling vision and implementing a strategic plan to achieve that vision.

Through teaching, research, and outreach, liberal arts faculty actively engage in creating positive change in the lives of our students and our communities, both locally and globally. Our society's most pressing problems, from climate change to social justice, require the creative, collaborative, and complex ways of thinking and making the Liberal Arts typifies. Multiple methodologies proliferate—from cutting—edge microscopy redefining human origins to feeding split—logs into a firewood kiln, from political theory to the philosophy of science, from social justice to visions of an equitable world, from writing a sonnet to applied community—engaged research—and overlap. These intersections, where the field edges into another field, position the CLA as one of CSU's most vitally collaborative colleges. The Center for Public Deliberation, the Center for Environmental Justice, the University Center for the Arts, and the newly—established Joe Blake Center for Engaged Humanities build frameworks for interdisciplinary and engaged scholarship. Our award—winning faculty engage in world—class research and creative endeavors and engage in innovative teaching practices, all in hopes of bettering our rapidly changing world.

Facilities and Centers

The College of Liberal Arts is housed in <u>six academic buildings</u> across campus. With a variety of labs, rehearsal and production spaces, galleries, and learning centers, our students, faculty, and community members have a variety of ways to engage in learning and exploration.

Through 18 Centers and Institutes, we conduct research and outreach with our communities. A few of our centers include the Institute for Research in the Social Sciences, the Center for Literary Publishing, Center for Public Deliberation, and the Public and Environmental History Center.



College Profile

With more than 500 faculty and 120 staff, the College of Liberal Arts fosters a broad and diverse **community of arts, humanities, and social science scholars** who study the cultural, social, environmental, and historical context in which we live. Together, we provide world-class research and creative activity, innovative teaching and learning, and impactful engagement with the campus and community.

Research and Creative Activity

Our external research productivity, measured by external dollars, has tripled in the last six years, and recent investment in research administration is aimed at increasing the number of faculty engaged in funded research overall. Our faculty address challenges of the 21st century: linguistic, literary, and artistic traditions of contemporary and historical cultures; social, economic, and political dimensions of justice, the environment, and technological change; understanding of key resources of the knowledge economy; and establishing places for the practice of an engaged and interdiscilinary humanities, arts and social sciences that spans the university and meets a critical need to educate civically engaged and productive citizens of the world.



Teaching and Learning

Producing over 200,000 student credit hours each year, we educate CSU undergraduate students, regardless of major, through the AUCC. We offer 19 majors, 54 concentrations, and 35 minors, which serves over 6,000 primary and secondary students in majors and minors, providing credentials to nearly 1/3 of CSU's student population. Premier MFA programs in art and creative writing, nationally ranked doctoral programs in Economics, Sociology, Political Science, Journalism, and growing Ph.D. programs in Anthropology, Communications, and Music Therapy attract more than 500 graduate students.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

Because many of our disciplines incorporate investigation of representation, access, and inclusion within course content as well as within the workplace and the community, the college hired a faculty coordinator of diversity, equity, and inclusion. That person's efforts, along with the Committee for Equity Advocacy, aims to advance a climate of equity and strengthen our college community by providing members with opportunities to share and learn, support each other with resources and feedback, and collaborate in assessing the present and planning for the future.



Collaboration and Engagement

We advance the university's reputation through excellence in our own disciplines and through collaboration in key institutional academic priorities such as water, sustainability, energy, environment, food, and climate. Through the University Center for the Arts, Gregory Allicar Museum of Art, galleries, and department events, we engage the campus and community through high-quality performances, exhibitions, and lecture series.



Strategic Initiatives & Directions

Our college contains three strategic initiatives and three strategic directions. Our signature initiatives represent the convergence of leadership priorities, grassroot action, and timely opportunities. We interweave equity and access with all we do, creating a strategic plan and departmental efforts that will improve the climate for all our community, especially under-represented faculty, staff, and students.



Clark Building Revitalization

Clark is CSU's academic powerhouse, housing classes from all 8 colleges, producing over \$100m in tuition each year.



Cultivate Democracy

We live in a crucial moment in history, witnessed by worldwide retraction of democracy, hardening partisanship, and growing distrust of traditional institutions, including higher education. We can be a leader in civics education that promotes and strengthens democracy.



Expand Engaged Scholarship
